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15	Q. 1	Good morning Mr. Monahan. Mr. Monahan you gave evidence in what was known as
16		the Cherrywood module on the 27th June, following upon that on the 7th July you
17		furnished the Tribunal with an additional narrative statement, is that correct?
18	Α.	That's correct.
19	Q. 2	I propose to take you through that statement Mr. Monahan. If at any point you
20		wish to correct anything please do so?
21	Α.	No problem.
22	Q. 3	"I make this supplemental statement in response to comments made by the
23		Tribunal in respect of my oral evidence given on the 27th June 2006. I wish to
24		make it clear from the outset that I stand over the evidence which I gave to
25		the Tribunal on that date. The purpose of this statement is not to change that
26		evidence but rather to attempt to explain its context in the hope that the
27		Tribunal might better understand my inability to provide more detailed answers
28		in relation to the matters under investigation in this module.
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30		Since I was first contacted by the Tribunal I have fully cooperated with the

11:35:591Tribunal and assisted its investigations to the best of my ability. The2information provided in both my narrative statement and my oral evidence has3been as complete and frank as possible. I have not withheld information from4the Tribunal. It has never been my intention to withhold information or to be11:36:1456I may have given to the contrary.

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I had no involvement in the relevant Monarch companies during the zoning or 8 9 development of the lands at Cherrywood. I have no first hand knowledge of the 11:36:26 10 matters currently under investigation and any information which I have provided 11 to the Tribunal has been the result of enquiries which I have undertaken with a 12 view to giving my full assistance to the Tribunal. In the course of such 13 enquiries I spoke to the following people who were involved in the companies during the time period under investigation: Dominic Glennane, Noel Murray, 14 Phil Reilly, Richard Lynn and John Sherwood. Monarch, of which I am now 11:36:44 15 16 Managing Director has also fully assisted the Tribunal in providing all 17 relevant files and in consenting to the Tribunal accessing relevant bank accounts and providing consent to everybody who acted for Monarch. 18

11:37:00 20 My involvement in Monarch began in May 2001. Prior to that I was involved in running my own companies and although I resided between Dundalk and Somerton, 21 where my father also resided, I had no more than a basic knowledge in his 22 business. My father was an extremely private man, especially in relation to 23 his business. It was not his practice to discuss his business dealings with 24 his family and he never sought my advice or confided in me in relation to the 11:37:23 25 26 project at Cherrywood in which he was involved. More over he never discussed any dealings that he or others in Monarch may have had with politicians nor did 27 he discuss donations or payments which he or anyone in Monarch may have made to 28 politicians. I was involved in other projects with my Father, while we both 29 11:37:46 30 live in Somerton during the 1990's. For example in 1993 we set up a vintage

car museum under the business expansion scheme. Any such projects were 11:37:51 1 entirely separate from the Monarch Group. 2 3 I was principally involved on my own behalf in four companies prior to my 4 engagement by Monarch on 2001. None of which had any connection with the 11:38:08 -5 Monarch Group. APR Properties Limited was founded in 1997 and was a property 6 7 company engaged, for example, in building apartments in Temple Bar in Dublin. I was a director of that company until January 2004. 8 9 11:38:25 10 Glenhurst Limited was involved in the Leisure business and sold vending 11 machines and games machines. I was involved in that company from around 1992. Print Corp Manufacturing Limited was involved in the business of printing 12 13 cinema magazines. I was director of that company from December 1995 to March 1997. The Trexco Leisure Limited, a property development company. 14 11:38:28 15 16 Ruining these and other company was a full-time job for me and did not allow time for any involvement in my father's businesses. The only Monarch related 17 company in which I was involved prior to 2001 was Allery Limited of which I was 18 a direct from February 1989 to May 1999. I had no shareholding in that company 19 11:38:45 20 which was partly owned by L&C Properties Limited. It was involved in selling gas in Dundalk and had no connection with Cherrywood. 21 22 I became involved with the main Monarch companies in May 2001. At that time my 23 father was unwell and wished to ensure that one of his sons would be in a 24 position to take over what was left of the business from him and with a view 11:39:02 25 that when he was not around that someone would be in control. I entered into a 26 contract of employment as Managing Director and a management agreement on 22 27 May 2001. On that date, and as a consequence of the agreements that I had 28 entered into I became a director of the two holding companies of the Monarch 29 11:39:19 30 Group. I was not appointed to the board of the directors of the operating

Monarch companies until July 2002 and did not become a signatory on company 11:39:22 1 cheques until April 2003. 2

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My father did not spend time explaining to me the structure and business of 4 Monarch when I became involved. This was in part due to his ill health and in 11:39:34 -5 part simply his style of approach. I was expected to read myself into the job 6 7 without assistance from my father and given the relatively small size of the company's interests at the time and the fact that the property were in areas 8 9 that I was familiar with this was not an onerous task. I relied, where 11:39:54 10 necessary, on the assistance of John Sherwood and to a lesser extent Ann 11 Gosling both of whom had been employed by the company for sometime and remained 12 on when I took over. I also received advice and information from Asple and 13 Company, who were at the time the company auditors and from Sean Mooney of 14 KPMG, a long time advisor to my father and other advisors. This can be 11:40:16 15 confirmed by same.

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The bulk of Monarch's interests had been taken over by Dunloe Ewart PLC in 1997 17 and all that remained in Monarch were property interests that did not fit in 18 19 with that company's plans. If all interests had been taken over Monarch would 11:40:37 20 have ceased to exist. As a result the company with which I became involved in May 2002 was a far smaller company than that which had existed at the time of 21 the Cherrywood Development, having only five staff when I understood it once 22 had well over 60. Cherrywood itself was no longer owned by Monarch so I had no 23 reason to acquaint myself with the history of that particular development. The 24 only lands held by the company in May 2001 were as follows: 11:40:46 25

Somerton House and lands, Dublin, Oatlands House and lands, Dublin, some units in Tallaght Shopping Centre, Dublin, Williamson's Mall, Dundalk, Blackrock 28 lands, Dundalk, Marsh Farmlands, Dundalk, Ballybrack lands, Dundalk and Carrick Road lands, Dundalk and Wilton House in Dundalk and Kilkenny lands, Kilkenny.

11:41:04 1 2 My job was to attempt to unlock any potential in these few remaining assets. 3 For example the lands at Somerton were already earmarked for development and planning permission had been acquired for a hotel and golf course. I saw that 4 project through to completion including finding an end user for the hotel. 11:41:16 -5 Similarly at Oatlands I took over ongoing negotiations already in existence. 6 7 Monarch has purchased no lands since Dunloe Ewart took over the main interest in 1997 and I have simply carried on the few projects left in existence at the 8 9 time I came on board. 11:41:34 10 11 I have also continued to develop my own property interests outside of Monarch provided that there is no conflict with the interests of Monarch. 12 13 I had no detailed knowledge of my father's involvement with this Tribunal. He 14 did not discuss the Tribunal with me or seek my advice or assistance in 11:41:43 15 16 responding to correspondence from the Tribunal. Although I became involved in the company while the Tribunal's investigations were under way the matter under 17 investigation had no bearing on the business of the companies at that time. 18 19 While it may appear surprising that we did not discuss these matters such an 11:42:01 20 approach was entirely consistent with my father's general attitude to his business affairs and I would not have expected him to seek my advice or 21 assistance in relation to such issues. My father and John Sherwood dealt with 22 the Tribunal through his solicitor Noel Smyth & Partners until his death in 23 2003. Ronan Hannigan, a partner in the firm, is in a position to confirm that 24 to the Tribunal should confirmation be required. While the matter was being 11:42:22 25 26 dealt with by them there was no need for me to take an active involvement or be fully briefed on the Tribunal's investigations. My only dealing with the 27 Tribunal while my father was alive was to swear an affidavit of discovery on 28 the 10 May 1992." I think that should read 2002, Mr Monahan? 29 11:42:42 30 Α. That's correct.

11:42:44 1 "This was necessary because my father was unwell at the time and could not swear the affidavit himself. My father died somewhat unexpectedly in August 2003 and presumably intended to continue to deal fully with the Tribunal's correspondence had that not occurred. Once he passed away, of necessity I
11:43:05 5 became involved and have fully assisted in so far as possible.

7 It is undoubtedly the case that I might be better able to assist the Tribunal had my father been more forthcoming in discussing the matter now under 8 investigation. However due to a combination of his ill health and his private 9 11:43:16 10 nature he did not raise these matters with me or to the best of my knowledge 11 with any member of the family before he died in 2003. While I can entirely 12 understand that this may seem somewhat unusual to an outsider such reticence 13 would come as no surprise to anyone who knew my father. It is an unfortunate consequence of my father's approach to his affairs that I am unable to provide 14 the detailed evidence which the Tribunal has sought from me. Nonetheless I 11:43:39 15 16 have provided whatever information is available to me and I wish to assure the Tribunal of my bona fides in so doing. I trust that this supplemental 17 statement has clarified the position to the Tribunal's satisfaction and I am at 18 the Tribunal's disposal to answer any further questions which may arise". Is 19 11:43:45 20 that your statement Mr. Monahan? 21 Α. It is, yes. Is there anything further you wish to add Mr. Monahan? 22 Q. 4 23 Α. No. Q. 5 Thank you Mr. Monahan. 24 11:43:52 25 26 MR SANFEY: No questions.

11:46:24	10			Mr. Cooling, but in any of the cases in which you went to the bank and got cash
	11			for a director of Monarch, do you know what happened to the proceeds?

7	Α.	So that was always made out to Allied Irish Bank.
8	Q. 20	But once the practice of making the cheques out to cash stopped, the new
9		practice was to make the payee on the cheque Allied Irish Bank?
10	Α.	Allied Irish Bank.
11	Q. 21	And the cheque payment book of Monarch Property Services Limited or which ever
12		among an company was used would record a cheque made payable to Allied Irish
13		Bank?
14	Α.	Yes.
15	Q. 22	In fact what was happening was the cheque was being cashed and the cash was
16		brought back to Monarch's offices, isn't that right?
17	Α.	Yes.
18	Q. 23	When you came back with the cheque, with the cash, you would give it, is that
19		correct, to the person who asked you for it, usually Mr. Phillip Monahan?
20	A.	Yes.
21	Q. 24	Now on occasion did any of the other directors ask you to get cash?
22	Α.	Oh, yes, if they were going on a trip they would come and I'd go over and get
23		whether it be sterling or whatever country they were going to.
24	Q. 25	And insofar as the cheque payments book records Allied Irish Banks as a payee
25		may the Tribunal take it that that generally speaking means that any such
26		cheque was a cheque that was cashed?
27	Α.	Not necessarily. I could make out the cheque to Allied Irish Bank for a draft,
28		could be a draft as well too besides cash.
