	19			8:30. What was the subject matter of your discussion at that time, Mr. Dunlop?

	23			by the Tribunal, was there any other matter planning or otherwise current in
	24			connection with Quarryvale that you would have required a face-to-face

	26	A.		No, not that I can think of.
	27	Q.	17	So the Tribunal may take it then, Mr. Dunlop, that the matter that required a

	6	A.		Not totally no.
	7	Q.	40	Now, again just looking at the I diary. On the 15th of October 1998, the
	8			Tribunal wrote for the first time, Mr. Dunlop, and you will have seen from the
	9			documentation from which you have been circulated at 22013. That arising out
10:20:01	10			of the article in the Sunday Independent on the 11th of October 1998, the
	11			Tribunal wrote to Barkhill which was the main Quarryvale related company
	12			seeking certain information which is more particularly identified at 22014.

14:22:54	25		and at 2100 of the brief Mr. Gallagher responds by letter dated the 31st of
	26		January 2000 at 2102.

	28		If I could refer you to page 2100. On the third paragraph.
	29		
14:23:10	30		"The Sole Member would appreciate if you could provide your statement to the

14:23:14	1	Tribunal by the 31st of January 2000. And if you would deal specifically in
	2	your statement with the following matters.
	3	
	4	A. Whether you attended any public meetings in connection with the rezoning of
14:23:26	5	Quarryvale and if so, the nature date and venue of such meetings, identity of
	6	the organisers and whether you addressed the meeting.
	7	
	8	B. Whether you attended any private meetings with any party or parties in
	9	connection with the rezoning of Quarryvale and if so the nature, purpose, dates
14:23:42	10	and venues of such meetings and the identity of the persons attending.
	11	
	12	C. Whether you were requested by any party to provide any assistance in
	13	connection with proposal to rezone Quarryvale and if so whether you provided
	14	such assistance and the nature and extent of such assistance.
14:23:58	15	
	16	D. Whether you were lobbied in connection with the rezoning of Quarryvale and
	17	if so in what manner when and by whom.
	18	
	19	E. Whether you were requested to or did solicit the support of any other
14:24:09	20	members of Dublin County Council for the rezoning of Quarryvale.
	21	
	22	F. Whether you were at any time for any purpose in receipt of any payment,
	23	donation or benefits, including any form of gift, assistance, service,
	24	facility, entertainment or any other benefit of a non-monetary nature from any
14:24:25	25	parties who were involved in the development of the Quarryvale Shopping Centre
	26	or from any person or companies acting object behalf of the developers."
	27	
	28	Mr. Gallagher responded by letter dated 31st of January 2000, at page 2102.
	29	
14:24:41	30	"I refer to your letter dated the 20th of December last. My answers to your

queries A to F is no in all cases. 14:24:50 1 2 3 I should however perhaps, slightly qualify the foregoing by saying that over the years my vote for or against a given proposition were frequently canvassed. 4 I was likewise lobbied on many occasions in regard to many different issues and 14:25:04 -5 received invitations to various functions for various purposes. 6 7 I have no recollection what ever of ever having attended any function or event 8 9 relating to the rezoning of Quarryvale and certainly never attended any such 14:25:21 10 function or received any payment, donation, benefit or otherwise. 11 Yours faithfully, Cyril Gallagher." 12 13 In relation to the current module, Mr. Dunlop on day 771 on the 9th of October 14 2007, has given evidence that he met Mr. Gallagher on the 30th of March 1991, 14:25:33 15 at Mr. Dunlop's office on Mount Street and it was there that they had a 16 discussion about Quarryvale and that Mr. Dunlop agreed to pay Mr. Gallagher a 17 contribution towards his election expenses. Mr. Dunlop gave evidence that on a 18 later date he paid Mr. Gallagher 1,000 pounds in cash in the context of support 19 14:25:58 20 and future support that Mr. Dunlop was going to acquire from him. 21 Mr. Dunlop confirmed that this payment was political contribution for 22 Mr. Gallagher and that no improper request was made. 23 24 If I could just refer in relation to Mr. Gallagher's voting record. The 14:26:11 25 26 Tribunal has assembled a document based on records from the Dublin County Council which summarises Mr. Gallagher's position in relation to Quarryvale. 27 This can be found at 17001. 28 29 14:26:28 30 If I could just refer you to it. And it outlines that Mr. Gallagher was

14:26:36	1	present on a special meeting of the Dublin County Council on the 16th of May
	2	1991, and voted for the motion at page 928. And at 932, the motion was passed.
	3	
	4	On the 17th of December 1992, Mr. Gallagher voted in favour of Quarryvale in
14:26:55	5	that he voted. If I could refer you to 17006.
	6	
	7	Amendment to motion 10.1.I to restrict retail shopping on the Quarryvale site
	8	to 250,000 square feet. The amendment motion was passed, 39 councillors voted
	9	for the proposed amendment, 28 voted against it and two councillors abstained
14:27:18	10	from voting. Councillor Gallagher voted in favour of the motion.
	11	
	12	And again the amendment to motion 10.1, to recruit the manager's recommendation
	13	that lands at Neilstown be zoned D, with the specific objective to encourage
	14	the development of specialised commercial, recreational, industrial,
14:27:36	15	residential uses in the area. The amendment motion was passed. 39 councillors
	16	voted for the proposed amendment, 28 voted against it and two councillors
	17	abstained from voting. Councillor Gallagher voted in favour of the motion.
	18	
	19	On the 4th of June 1993, Mr. Gallagher was present at the special meeting and
14:27:57	20	voted in favour to amend the written statement. Mr. Gallagher was present at
	21	the special meeting held on the 19th of October 1993, and confirmed the
	22	amendment to map 16.
	23	
	24	And finally, Mr. Gallagher was present on the 10th of December 1993, to adopt
14:28:13	25	the plan and voted in favour of this.
	26	
	27	Although there are no allegations made against Mr. Gallagher. Mr. Dunlop has
	28	stated that he gave 1,000 pounds in cash to Mr. Gallagher for a political
	29	contribution which Mr. Gallagher failed to refer to in his statement to the
14:28:28	30	Tribunal.
4		

14:28:29	1	There are a number of unexplained number of transactions that fall within
	2	the window period. By letter dated 29th of October 2004, at page 14489. The
	3	Tribunal identified a number of unexplained lodgements on Mr. Gallagher's
	4	accounts attaching a schedule at 14491.
14:28:54	5	
	6	And if I can refer you to page 5348. On the 29th of May 1991, there is a
	7	lodgement of 250 pounds. On the 11th of June 1991, there is a lodgement of
	8	506.70 pounds. On the 17th of June 1991, there is a lodgement of 800 pounds.
	9	On the 25th of June 1991, there is a lodgement of 550 pounds. On the 5th of
14:29:37	10	July 1991, there is a lodgement of 140 pounds. The 16th of July 1991, there is
	11	a lodgement of 326 pounds.
	12	
	13	And on page 5349, it shows that all the documents, all the back up
	14	documentations have been shredded in relation to these lodgements.
14:30:00	15	
	16	There are further lodgements in Ulster Bank on page 5421. On the 28th of May
	17	1991, there is a lodgement of 119.70 pounds on the 25th of June 1991, there is
	18	a lodgement of 239.40 pounds. Finally a lodgement into Mr. Gallagher's An Post
	19	account at page 5475 on the 2nd of July 1991, a lodgement of 3,000 pounds and
14:30:34	20	the back up documentation at page 5477 shows that the method of payment was
	21	cash. No explanation has been given to the Tribunal in relation to these
	22	lodgements.

	24	This concludes the evidence of Mr, the late Cyril Gallagher.
